Signalling improvements in Khayelitsha

The City recently installed a traffic signal at the intersection of **Japhta K Masemola Road and Bonga Drive in Khayelitsha**. This was in response to a community request to enhance road safety and improve traffic flow for motorists. The project also entailed dropped kerbs and tactile paving to improve access for those with special needs, traffic cameras to detect motorists skipping the red light, and pedestrian push buttons.



The South African National Road Agency (SANRAL) in partnership with the City also installed traffic signals at the **intersection of the N2 and Mew Way in Khayelitsha**. The new signals will alleviate the congestion for those travelling on the N2 and wanting to enter Khayelitsha at Mew Way. Peak-hour traffic used to back up at this intersection, and had to be regulated manually by City Traffic officers.



R101 m approved for Sir Lowry's housing

The City's Sir Lowry's Pass Village housing project is expected to be completed by early 2024. The R101 million project includes bulk earthworks, civil engineering services for water, sanitation and roads, electricity reticulation and street lighting, and freestanding and semidetached duplex units. The affordable housing project will provide 307 opportunities.

Beneficiaries will be selected in accordance with the City's Housing Allocation Policy and Housing Needs Register to ensure that housing opportunities are made available in a fair and transparent manner to those who qualify for housing in terms of the applicable legislation.

City gears up for winter

As winter slowly rolls in, various interventions are under way to protect Capetonians and their homes from flooding as far as possible

ewer jetting is used to prepare the wastewater system for the winter rains, with jet vacuum trucks removing roots, litter, sand and other obstacles that can cause sewer blockages. By the end of June, City teams will have jet-cleaned 100 km of pipes in the most flood-prone parts of town. Teams are also cleaning stormwater drains, ponds, canals and gullies in flood-prone areas, while Disaster Risk Management staff have initiated visits to 38 high-risk areas to warn residents about potential flooding.

To look after those living on the Mother City's streets, R10 million will go directly to increasing beds at NGO-run shelters for the duration of winter. The City's programme been boosted to R77 million for the new financial year.

- Waterproof roofs, clear gutters and remove dead tree branches.

- Check for illegal stormwater-to-sewer cross-connections on your property, where water is channelled from roofs, gutters and paved or hard surfaces into sewer drains.

The leading lights in health care

International Nurses' Day on 12 May served to highlight the critical role these frontline warriors fulfil in health care. In the last year, City nurses saw an average of 225 653 clients a month. These caring practitioners not only provide primary health care, but also treat their patients holistically. They reach beyond the immediate problems to help address the wellness impact of psychological and socioeconomic factors such as poverty, unemployment and ethnicity. Sadly, three City Health nurses lost their lives in the Covid-19 battle. The City acknowledges this loss, and honours the passion, dedication and innovation of all its nurses. As we battle the fifth wave, residents are urged to give

back to these frontline heroes by getting vaccinated, not only to protect themselves and their loved ones, but also our nurses and other medical staff.

Moody's says we're stable

Moody's Investors Service has published its latest credit opinion reaffirming the City's existing long and short-term national and global-scale rating of Aa3.za/P-1. za and Ba3/NP respectively, and changed our outlook from negative to stable. This comes after the City received its 17th consecutive unqualified audit report, as well as the change in outlook for the country from negative to stable.

The rating reflects the City's moderate financial performance, supported by prudent financial management and a large and diversified economic base. Cape Town has consistently generated a robust operating surplus with stronger liquidity and lower debt than its South African peers also rated by Moody's.

Our credit profile is constrained by capital spending pressure and the weak national economic environment, which is worsened by Covid-19 restrictions. This is expected to moderate the City's operating performance, but the resilience in our cash position is expected to remain. Its low debt level and its liquidity reserves place the City in a favourable

Load-shedding app a ray of light

The newly launched City load-shedding app provides real-time information on load-shedding in your area. It also enables residents to log electricity service requests and locate a prepaid-electricity outlet. The app is available for download in the Apple App Store and Google Play Store. Simply add your suburb via a map, by entering your location, or by using the search box. No personal details are required, although users do have the option to receive load-shedding alerts.

City Fire staffers celebrated

On 4 May, the City marked International Firefighters' Day, commending all its firefighting staff, both permanent and seasonal, for attending to nearly 23 000 emergencies in the past year. Residents were also afforded the opportunity to visit some of the City's fire stations to learn more about the Fire and Rescue Service.

The City's firefighters work long hours, normally in unbearable heat, to provide an indispensable service ensuring all residents' safety and security. Sadly, while putting their lives on the line for others, they're also often attacked and robbed of their equipment.

Between 1 May 2021 and 28 April 2022, the Fire and Rescue Service responded to 22 632 incidents. The bulk of these were fire-related, 3 709 were motor vehicle accidents, 569 were incidents of assault, and many others were medical emergencies.

Moreover, over the past six months, the service was augmented by 40 seasonal firefighters, recruited especially for the summer season to help combat wildfires. This valuable resource enabled Fire and Rescue to respond to 8 202 vegetation fires between November 2021 and April 2022.



Residents invited to craft 'Future Strand'

The City is piloting a new approach where communities can map planning initiatives in their own areas. One of the first initiatives following this approach is the drafting of the Strand local spatial development framework (LSDF), for which an inaugural meeting took place in May.

Called 'Future Strand', the initiative is aimed at revitalising this seaside town, making it attractive for people to live, invest and linger in. This comes in response to a growing desire among residents and businessowners to see Strand reach its full potential. The purpose of the LSDF is to re-establish this once vibrant neighbourhood, create a sense of belonging, and establish a multicultural community.

The LSDF will contain proposals for a number of initiatives for the short (one year) and longer term (five to seven years) that will help rebuild Strand in a sustainable manner and connect it with the surrounding areas.

It is hoped that a combination of place-based activities, public art installations and improved streetscapes will attract investment by property developers, businessowners and homeowners' associations.

The 21 largest properties in central Strand combined are valued at R250 million, so the need to protect and enhance this portfolio is urgent. A City project management team will regularly meet with community organisations and residents to coordinate and provide support for Future Strand projects. The collaboration will culminate in a draft LSDF, which will guide future development to revitalise the town and reignite its economy.

Hey Help Woman delivers concrete benefits

Creating skills and economic opportunities for local women

he national Community Development Worker (CDW) programme offers community members economic skills training to engage in sustainable economic activities, improve their livelihoods, and facilitate a more constructive relationship with government to boot.

This programme is paying 'concrete' dividends in the suburbs of Sir Lowry's Pass and Chris Nissen Park, Somerset West. After the CDW for the area identified a lack of skills and jobs as key challenges for these communities, especially women, the City partnered with Province to launch the Hey Help Woman project in 2021. The project equips local women with the skills to craft decorative items such as garden pots out of cement. Two local community members willing to transfer their skills provided the training.

City's gone camping again



Happy campers: The City has resumed its Camp Cape Town initiative for youth between 11 and 16 years who are identified as leaders at various community centres across town. During a recent camp at Voortrekker Park, Strand, young leaders were assessed for shortlisting with a view to the City's three-year Recreational Leadership Development Programme.

Hundreds of youth participate in City sport and recreation programmes all year round. Some of them stand out for their willingness to help organise events, for motivating others to join, and for being role models by leading healthy lifestyles. These young leaders are invited to join the City's Camp Cape Town for mentorship and development.

Since its inception in 2014, Camp Cape Town has mentored 180 teenagers into informed and active citizens. The purpose is to motivate the youth to use their free time responsibly, and to be creative in offering safe spaces or

projects that peers in their local communities can opt for instead of getting involved in antisocial behaviour.

At a recent camp in Strand, City staff assessed some of these young recruits for their ability to work in a team, solve problems, and lead. The 36 teens who rated the highest secured their place in the three-year Recreational Leadership Development Programme. They will start the journey by attending weekend training workshops, volunteering at City programmes and events, and becoming part of the teams who organise afterschool and holiday programmes at plies, including plants, sand, stones and pebbles, soil, gloves and masks, spades, wheelbarrows, cement, concrete dye and paint. They also helped the women develop a business plan to seek private investment, while the community liaison officer is supporting them in accessing local craft markets.

Your best shot at staying healthy

Flu vaccines

With winter upon us, City Health encourages immune-compromised individuals to receive the flu vaccine. Older persons and those more at risk of severe illness will receive priority where vaccine stocks are limited.

Don't veer off the 'Road to Health' Parents should ensure that their children receive all their vaccinations in line with the *Road to Health* booklet. To protect children from a number of serious diseases, they should be vaccinated at birth, at 6, 10 and 14 weeks, at 9 and 18 months, and at 6 and 12 years.

Covid-19

In our fifth wave of coronavirus infections, vaccination continues to be a priority. Those above 60 years and/ or with comorbidities are urged to receive the vaccine and booster shots, as these will prevent severe disease that may result in hospitalisation or death.

Good progress with Somerset West PTI

The City is making good progress with the construction of a new R65 million public transport interchange (PTI) in Somerset West. This project is the biggest investment in central Somerset West in recent years. Once complete, the facility will transform the area with multiple benefits for commuters, pedestrians, public transport operators and traders. An estimated 1 000 commuters and 300 minibus taxis will use the new PTI, which will serve Lwandle, Macassar, Firgrove, Strand, Nomzamo, Sir Lowry's Pass Village, Zola, Khavelitsha, Stellenbosch, Somerset West and surrounds, and Grabouw. Work on Welcome Zenzile under way

Remedial work along Welcome Zenzile Road, linking Ndlulamthi Street in Khayelitsha with Ntlolokshane Street in Kuyasa, is under way. This follows after a section of the embankment slopes of the road eroded due to a sewage spill, which, in turn, was caused by a blockage in the overloaded sewer system. Work is scheduled to be completed by the end of June, weather permitting.

The road will remain open to traffic. Once fully restored, the link will encourage a safe and socially connected community, and improve access for motorists and pedestrians between Khayelitsha and Kuyasa.

Steenbras Lower hits a century

'Old Faithful' still going strong after 100 years



he Steenbras Lower dam, situated in the Hottentots-Holland mountains near Gordon's Bay, approximately 64 km from Cape Town, was the first major dam built after the initial, smaller dams on top of Table Mountain. It served as the major water source for central Cape Town, which was the main hub of development at the time,

and supplied the Molteno reservoir in

Oranjezicht, which is also still in use.

Since initial construction in 1921, the dam wall has been raised twice, and now stands at a height of 27,5 m. Yet the intake tower, valves and 750 mm castiron pipeline are all still original, and going strong.

Steenbras Lower and baby brother Upper, constructed in 1977, have a combined storage volume of 65 290 M^ℓ. Lower has a slightly larger capacity at 33 520 M². When Upper is 100% full,

the water overflows into Lower. Water transfer from Upper to Lower can also take place mechanically via a connecting pipe with isolation valves.

The two dams are particularly popular with residents in City-supplied electricity areas. Forming part of the electricity pumped-storage scheme that provides Cape Town with cost-effective hydrogenerated electricity, the dams help lighten residents' load-shedding load.

Mfuleni youth bead for a better future

The City and Province have trained ten unemployed youth from Mfuleni in making traditional beaded attire. The training, which took place at Power-Child campus, forms part of the Bokamoso Ba Rona ('Our Future') programme launched in October 2021. Bokamoso Ba Rona specifically targets unemployed youth who have to contribute financially to their households. Trainees were also taught how to use social media platforms to sell their handiwork.

Orders for their projects significantly increased during the December holidays as community members took part in various celebrations that required traditional beads. The beadwork was also showcased at craft markets, where interest from the public was encouraging. The project is being evaluated to inform further roll-out.

Huge uptake for reinstated MyCiTi **N2 Express**

Commuters are clearly relieved and grateful to have the MyCiTi N2 Express service up and running again after a protracted operational dispute. To date, a total of 18 438 myconnect cards - essential for MyCiTi travel - have been sold at the MyCiTi Mitchells Plain station and Kuyasa kiosk. This indicates that commuters value the service as a viable alternative to travel to central Cape Town.

A fleet of 34 buses have been made available since reinstatement. Vehicles are allocated on a daily basis based on availability and increasing passenger demand. The fleet comprises a combination of 12 m and 18 m low-floor buses.
