# The City has contracted a research

Survey coming

your way

organisation to conduct a large-scale household survey to better understand the set-up and service delivery needs of Cape Town's households. The findings will inform the City's investment decisions and service delivery planning.

Up until May, interviewers will visit 10 000 households, randomly selected from suburbs across town. They will be clearly identifiable by their reflective vests and ID badges. Householders will also receive a pamphlet with a QR code to access details of the survey on the City's website. While participation is entirely voluntary, the City appeals to the selected households to complete the interview, which should not take longer than 40 minutes.

Information to be gathered includes socioeconomic and demographic details (age, gender, general health and wellbeing), current employment, level of education, migration, modes of transport, homeownership or rental status, household income and expenditure, access to services, and use of public amenities.

Rest assured that the survey is legitimate and POPIA-compliant. All information gathered will be used for statistical and research purposes only.

# War on waterguzzling alien plants

Thirsty alien plant species guzzle up 55 billion litres of Cape Town's precious water every year. This is why removing them forms a key part of the City's Water Strategy and long-term New Water Programme.

Back in 2021, the City invested R50 million in the Greater Cape Town Water Fund (GCTWF) to combat the threat of alien invasives. Other partners committed to the GCTWF are CapeNature, the South African National Biodiversity Institute, The Nature Conservancy (TNC), the World Wide Fund for Nature South Africa, and Working

Through the GCTWF's efforts, almost 50 000 ha of alien plants have been cleared to date, returning 16,1 billion litres of water to Cape Town's groundwater sources. This is equivalent to 44 million litres of water per day. In the process, 787 green jobs have also been created.

The City and TNC clear alien plants in four catchments: Wemmershoek, Steenbras, Berg River and the Atlantis aquifer area. In the first six months of the 2023/24 financial year alone, they restored 3 472 ha of alien-invaded land. The City has committed R25 million to continue the clearing activities in these catchments.

# Together, we'll power through and beat load-shedding

he future of our city, the dignity of every Capetonian and the sustainability of every Cape Town business depend on our energy security. Without a reliable supply of affordable electricity, Cape Town will not fulfil its potential, and we will come up short in our mission of building a city of hope for all who live and work here. This is why our efforts to beat load-shedding, and ultimately end our dependence on Eskom, are so critically important.

Our recently released 2050 Energy Strategy is our blueprint for achieving this goal. We are the first and only metro in the country with such a detailed energy plan, and we hope to show the rest of South Africa that an energy-secure future is indeed possible.

The strategy outlines our immediate load-shedding mitigation measures and how we intend to avoid the first four stages by 2026 through energy procurement and demand management programmes. At the same time, it looks far into the future in terms of alleviating energy poverty and ensuring that the Cape Town of tomorrow is built for optimal energy use.

One of the key aspects of the strategy is to move away from a

single, central, inefficient state-owned energy monopoly, towards decentralised, cost-effective and increasingly carbonneutral energy. And it doesn't get more decentralised than our groundbreaking Cash for Power programme. The programme enables households and businesses with approved grid-tied small-scale generation systems and a bi-directional electricity meter in City supply areas to sell their excess rooftop solar power back to us for cash.

We've just registered a first batch of

households who applied, bringing the first registration window to a close. I urge every Capetonian with rooftop solar panels and a grid-tied system to consider taking us up on this offer. We will buy as much power as you can sell. We're also in the final testing phase of a cheaper bi-directional meter to make this an even more attractive option. So. look out for the second registration window, which will open shortly. If you're happy to have your City bill credited rather than receiving cash, this will be done automatically, and there is no need to apply.

Similarly, I encourage Capetonians to become Power Heroes by joining our voluntary demand management programme that remotely switches off nonessential loads such as geysers and pool pumps during high-use times. This could reduce citywide power demand by some 60 MW and could be a real game-changer in our fight against load-shedding.

Cash for Power as well as Power Heroes offer you a chance to play a part in putting load-shedding behind us. Please consider signing up and help us build a city of hope

# **Pressing on with** infrastructure project pipeline

The latest Infrastructure Report confirms that 73% of this year's record R11 billion infrastructure budget has been spent and will specifically benefit lower-income households and people living in informal settlements. Infrastructure investment will create some 135 000 jobs over three years, along with many more downstream economic benefits.

Projects, projects, everywhere Water and sanitation infrastructure now accounts for 42% of the overall ten-year project pipeline. Multi-billion-rand upgrades to seven wastewater works are on

track. Through its New Water Programme, the City also aims to add 300 million litres of water per day from new sources by 2030.

Urban mobility projects of R21 billion will improve public transport along the three major corridors of Khayelitsha-Century City, Symphony Way, and Klipfontein. And in terms of waste management, ten new drop-off facilities planned up to 2035 will see the City reduce the radius of this service from 7 km to 3 km. Moreover, some R55,5 billion of the ten-year pipeline has been earmarked to build Cape Town's resilience against drought, fire, heat, flooding and storm surges.

# Western Cape dam levels drop amid high temperatures

The dam levels for Cape Town have dropped to 68,5%. The City is still aiming for an overall usage target of 650 million litres per day which means Capetonians should try to use less than 105 litres per person per day.

Dam levels - individual dams and total storage - by year



A fiery four months: October 2023 to January 2024 was a very busy period for the Fire and Rescue Service, with 13 087 incidents responded to, of which 55% were vegetation fires. Cape Town has 32 fire stations, and construction on a new one in Langa starts soon. Every day, the City's fire stations have at least 240 firefighters on operational duty, and incident management teams are on standby around the clock in the event of major incidents. The Service's operational fleet comprises over 200 vehicles, including fire appliances, water tenders, heavy technical rescue units, aerial appliances, and watercraft.

Sonder die betroubare voorsiening van bekostigbare elektrisiteit sal Kaapstad nie sy potensiaal verwesenlik nie en sal ons tekortskiet in ons missie om 'n stad van hoop te bou. Dít is waarom ons pogings om beurtkrag te beëindig, en uiteindelik nie meer op Eskom te moet staatmaak nie, so belangrik is.

# Cracking on with Plumstead pipe replacement

Preparations for phase 3 of the 1 300 m water pipe replacement project in Plumstead is under way. Phases 1 and 2 involved replacing pipes in St Joans and Gray roads in November and December 2023 respectively. The third phase will cover Adelaide and Rivers End roads.

The City is using trenchless pipe-cracking technology to replace the ageing fibre-cement pipes with high-density polyethylene (HDPE) ones. A bursting head is hydraulically pulled through the existing pipe, breaking it apart, while a new pipe is pulled along to replace the old one at the same time. This method has shown to be less expensive than the conventional way. The reduced need for excavations also ensures quicker completion and less disruption.

# Jobs Connect plants seed with unemployed youth

Local youth offered the chance to participate in a learnership in mixed farming systems

ccredited agricultural education and training provider SEED and the Rocklands Abundance Centre in Mitchells Plain are offering 15 local youth the chance to participate in a learnership in mixed farming systems.

Learners are taught how to grow plants, flowers and vegetables. The veggies go to local feeding schemes, while the plants and flowers are used in the manufacture of hair products, washing powder, soaps and more. The ultimate aim is to equip the learners with the skills to start and run their own agribusinesses. The recruits were selected via Jobs Connect, the City's online workforce development platform.

#### Matchmaking for jobs

Launched in 2021, Jobs Connect is data-free for MTN and Vodacom users. It requires users to create an online profile, which serves as their digital CV, and to complete a digital numeracy and literacy assessment. Both the CV and the assessment certificates are downloadable.

Once registered and assessed, job seekers can view the training and learnership opportunities available and are even able

to search by area. Businessowners, in turn, can register as employers on the platform to look for suitable talent. Individuals selected for an interview are then automatically notified via SMS or WhatsApp.

Managed on behalf of the City by Leelyn Management, Jobs Connect recently also collaborated with Smile FM to secure

12 914 job opportunities for Capetonians in a matter of weeks. This was well above the campaign's target of 10 000 jobs.

A little bird told us: Bird enthusiasts will be pleased to know that the Knysna warbler (Bradypterus sylvaticus), endemic to South Africa and thought to be extinct in Cape Town, has been spotted again. This juvenile was recently photographed in the Newlands section of the Table Mountain national park by avid birder John Graham. Mike Buckham, chair of the Cape Bird Club, also heard a Knysna warbler calling on one of his regular runs in the same area in November last year. The unassuming little bird inhabits dense tangles and thickets in or on the edge of forests. While extremely secretive, it has a distinctive call that consists of clear, high-pitched notes that accelerate and end in a trill. # **Showing Rondevlei some love** For World Wetlands Day, marked

on 2 February, Ald Eddie Andrews (the City's Deputy Mayor and Mayco member for Spatial Planning and Environment) joined Biodiversity Management staff, City river wardens and Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) workers at the Rondevlei section of False Bay nature reserve to clear invasive species from the wetland.

Of South Africa's 791 wetland ecosystem types, 48% are critically endangered, 12% are endangered, and 5% are vulnerable. Over 70% have no protection. This makes wetlands the country's most threatened ecosystem.

The City's river wardens are based at the Table Bay, Zandvlei and False Bay nature reserves. Their primary task is to enhance the health of ecosystems in catchment areas. To this end, they clear invasive plant species, facilitate rehabilitation activities, and collect and remove litter. Many EPWP workers also specifically focus on protecting Cape Town's green infrastructure and natural systems.

Considering that South Africa has already lost approximately half of its original wetland area, the Mother City's wetlands and vleis need our tender loving care.

Calling all picnickers to Rondevlei: In December, the City unveiled the newly expanded picnic area at the Rondevlei section of the False Bay nature reserve. The old plant nursery has been repurposed to provide extra space for families and children to picnic and play, and perhaps catch a glimpse of Rondevlei's famous hippos. Apart from Rondevlei, which was established in 1952 as a bird sanctuary, False Bay nature reserve also comprises Zeekoevlei, the Strandfontein birding section, Pelican Park, Slangetjiebos and the Zandwolf coastal section.



Jabula joins the grid: Maurine Hendricks (pictured above) is one of the residents of Jabula informal settlement in Philippi who were connected to the power grid in December 2023. Jabula is located on privately owned land, and the landowner had to grant permission for the City to provide electricity to the 63 informal structures. In City-supplied areas and on City-owned land, almost all older informal settlements have now been connected to electricity where it is possible to do so. These also include formal subsidised housing, infills and backyarders. In 2022/23, the City spent R23 million on electrifying approximately 2 440 households.

# Rundown on roadworks

Roadworks are under way along Lantana Street, Juno Road and Silversands Avenue in

Mitchells Plain. The existing road surface is being milled and removed, and replaced with new asphalt. Work also involves installing new kerbs, constructing a new speed hump, and reinstating all road markings.

Roadworks in the **Crawford** area should be done by 9 April. The project includes the construction of a new parking embayment and sidewalk in Thornton Road between Camberwell and Kromboom roads.



Out with the old, in with the **Newlands:** To continue providing safe drinking water to residents, the City invested R2,1 million in refurbishing three chlorination plants at Newlands reservoir, being one of Cape Town's oldest. New injector systems were installed along with new and improved safety features. Newlands reservoir can hold 132,6 million litres of water and supplies Wynberg reservoir, Bishopscourt, Hout Bay, Llandudno, Newlands, Claremont, Kenilworth, Groote Schuur, the University of Cape Town, Rondebosch, Molteno reservoir, Ottery, Strandfontein, Pelican Park, Wetton, Lotus River, Retreat, Steenberg, Muizenberg and Grassy Park. # City's got big plans for POA


The Council-approved local spatial development framework for the Philippi opportunity area envisages a major transformation for this high-potential Cape Town location

hrough sound local planning and smart public infrastructure investment, the local spatial development framework (LSDF) recently approved for the Philippi opportunity area (POA) is set to unlock development opportunities in Philippi East, the Philippi industrial area, Heinz Park, Nyanga, Crossroads and a portion of Gugulethu.

#### POA packs a punch

The +/-800 ha POA is close to the Philippi horticultural area, Cape Town International Airport as well as both the N2 and R300. This strategic location means it has the potential to be turned into a thriving and sustainable area, and to catalyse the development of the metro southeast.

The vision is for the POA to be transformed into a mixed-use node with



green spaces and an industrial character. Ideally, the area will comprise a mix of higher-density residential development, retail and recreational spaces in walkable precincts, supported by transport facilities and quality social amenities.

The no-cost transfer programme, launched a year ago, funds the attorney transfer fees and insurance costs of the rental units from the date of sale until the registration of the property. Tenants of some 22 000 Cityowned rental units or serviced sites may qualify. Nearly R40 million has been allocated for these free transfers over three years.



# Stand by, metro southeast, MyCiTi's coming

Two additional work packages as part of the MyCiTi metro southeast roll-out commenced in the latter half of 2023.

### Sky circle's taking shape

The first involves the continuation of the 'sky circle' – the freestanding elevated traffic circle at the intersection of Govan Mbeki Road (M9) and Jan Smuts Drive (M17) in Lansdowne. This latest section of the project is concentrated on the area from the Govan Mbeki and Heinz Road

intersection moving eastwards, past the Edith Stevens nature reserve, up to the Govan Mbeki Road and Sabelo Sithole Street intersection.

The circle, the first of its kind in South Africa, will be dedicated to MyCiTi buses, offering them passage across this busy intersection without affecting general traffic below. However, all road users will benefit from the major improvements to the intersection and surrounding roads that form part of the project.

#### ... and bus lanes being built

The second package sees work being done along AZ Berman Drive in Mitchells Plain from just north of the R300 interchange up to the AZ Berman and Wespoort Drive intersection in the south.

In November 2023, the project team also completed a new pedestrian bridge in Lentegeur in the vicinity of Watergate Estate. The bridge provides a safe railway crossing to pedestrians and will improve access to the new MyCiTi station to be located along AZ Berman Drive.

# No more number guessing

To show that it means business, the City has launched a new one-stop number for all queries relating to building plans and development.

This should be welcome news to residents and development professionals, who previously had to phone the eight planning district offices for assistance, each with its own contact number. This was particularly confusing to those unfamiliar with the City's district planning boundaries, who were unsure which district office to contact.

The new number, 021 401 4702, is available Mondays to Fridays from 08:00 to 16:00. Use it for any development-related query, from building plan submissions to land use applications and anything in between.
